As mentioned previously, Windycrest no longer has a facilities manager/maintenance engineer. While we have made arrangements with a contractor to start mowing the grass this spring, we will have to pick up after ourselves, at least for a while. Please take your trash with you when you leave the Club grounds and try to leave the place at least as nice as you found it.

If your boat is in a slip, please make time this spring to check your dock lines and/or boat lift for wear and replace or adjust as necessary. Remember, we no longer have an employee walking the docks to keep an eye on our boats. If you see that your neighbor's boat needs attention, please contact them, or let me know and I will pass on the information. Also, it's a good idea to have your registration up to date, and the numbers clearly legible.

If you keep a boat trailer (with or without a boat on it) at Windycrest, please ensure your name is clearly marked on the port side of the forward end of the trailer (extra points if it's on both sides). Also, the tires must be inflated so the trailer could be moved in the event of an emergency.

It's been a busy Spring at Windycrest, replete with planned and unplanned maintenance projects. Electric service to B-dock, D-dock and the Pavilion has been completely rewired and brought up to code. As of this writing, all is functional. The contractor, Gilley Electric, has only to run a new overhead feed to D-dock to complete the job.

An unusually high water bill alerted us to a leak that apparently started last fall, and water to the bathhouse was temporarily shut off. A faulty valve was subsequently detected and replaced by Jack and Jesse Stewart, and water service to the bathhouse has been restored. The city will credit the Windycrest account for the above-average water usage.

Thanks to the efforts of Bob McGinnis and his crew (Rick Martin, Richard Burton, Barend Meiling, and Dan Edwards), the maintenance barn has been cleaned and organized. Some stuff was discarded, but there should be a pile of salvaged useful-to-someone things on a table by the tent camping/disc golf area. Also, there are several rolls of heavy duty fire hose free for the taking by the Maintenance barn.

If you go by the Keelboat Lot, you may notice that numbered markers have been installed to identify the stalls. The plan is to install a marker at every boat/camper/trailer lot space. This will likely be a work party project.

And Speaking of Work Party, it will be Saturday, May 4. Mark your calendar.

Solar Battery Charger for your Boat

Recently took the good advice from current board member Mike Darrol (Electrical Engineer) regarding a low cost, reliable and relatively maintenancefree means to keep my J-80's boat battery topped off on D-dock. He advised that he'd experienced good luck with a Harbor Freight purchased "Thunderbolt-Magnum" 1.5-Watt solar battery charger for years. I picked one up about 2 months ago and added a charging regulator accessory for the setup (same brand, same aisle in the store). The regulator helps assure you don't "over-charge" the battery beyond 100%. Also, know that if you need to make a long run of installation distance from the interior battery location to the outside of your boat where the solar panel rests... you can purchase wire-lead extensions for another \$20 bucks.

Like most modern things, the solar set up is calibrated to do its job with no input from me. Simply place the solar panel out of the wind and where it will receive as much southerly direct sunlight. Try to place the solar panel where it will most likely survive springtime Oklahoma storms and not get "flipped" (its lightweight) overboard while you're away from your boat! Mine rests flat on the cockpit floor, well out of the wind. Watch the wires as you route them over the top of your hatch board/covers to avoid a hard pinch. While charging with the regulator, you'll see a color-coded indicator "light up" to let you know it's working.

The charger's been through the coldest winter spell already and powers my bilge pump and LED cabin lights via the 12volt boat battery and has worked well so far. No complaints. Some of you might think of using one of these units in other ways around the home to maintain a remote battery on an RV, riding mower, etc. - think of the opportunities.

Thanks to Mike for the nice recommendation and here's to not lugging my boat battery up the D-dock walkway this year for a maintenance charge!
